LETTER FROM THE STUDENT NETWORK CHAIR

On September 12, 2023, the ISPOR Student Network Education Committee hosted a webinar to introduce several strategies for communicating the results of one's research study. Erin Weeda, PharmD (University of South Carolina School of Medicine) moderated a thorough discussion with Andrew Palmer, MBBS (University of Tasmania) and Michael Drummond, DPhil (University of York), focusing on key considerations and strategies for developing a value story for high-quality scientific publications. With both having decorated backgrounds in publication and editing, Andrew and Michael provided amazing insights from the perspectives of a manuscript author and journal editor. These strategies can be used regardless of study methodology (e.g., chart reviews, database analyses, economic models) and publication type (e.g., abstract, poster, manuscript, report).

Andrew Palmer, MBBS is a health economist of 29 years with a strong background in consulting and academia. He has published over 290 peer-reviewed papers in international journals throughout his career, of which 70–80 percent are in clinical journals. For the past 10 years, Andrew has served as Associate Editor of Health Economics of the “Diabetic Medicine” issues of the Diabetes UK journal and has covered a wide range of topics—including reviews, clinical trials, education, psychology, care, delivery, pregnancy, and epidemiology. From the perspective of a reviewer, he noted during the session that while journals are looking to improve their review turnaround time for authors, research journals are also always looking to improve their impact factor. He also continued by providing the following tips below:

- Original articles must include a structured abstract.
- Grab the editor's attention by including a cover letter; make it short and attention grabbing.
- Your research must resonate with the target audience (e.g., clinicians versus health economists); it should be technical enough for a health economist audience but more generalized for a clinical audience.

Michael Drummond, DPhil has been a health economics researcher since 1976. He has served as Director of the Centre for Health Economics at the University of York for 10 years and has submitted over 750 publications throughout his career. Michael has honorary doctorates from City University (London), Erasmus University (Rotterdam), and University of Lisbon, and he has served as Co-Editor-in-Chief of ISPOR's Value in Health since 2010. In talking about the value and interest level of a research paper, Michael stated that interest in research methods is positively correlated with the interest in policy and decision making—in that as the audience or reviewer gains interest in the methods, there is a gained desire to formulate new policies and make informed decisions surrounding the research topic. Michael noted that to communicate high value, one's research manuscript should consist of the following characteristics:

- Enthusiasm—if you are not enthusiastic about your research, it's more difficult to get others interested in it.
- Originality—originality can be demonstrated by providing new data (the easiest way), new methods, or new ideas (the hardest way).
- Organization—most empirical research fits into the standard 'Objectives, Methods, Results, Discussion, Conclusions' structure.
- Good Communication—preferably in past tense with clear text to highlight main points and ideas.
- Relevance to Policy or Practice—readers may not be interested in data alone; the paper needs to relate to an issue the reader thinks is important.

The session concluded with further discussion surrounding these themes, as well as insight into the current and/or future role of large language models (e.g., ChatGPT, LLaMA, BARD, etc.,) in the publication process.

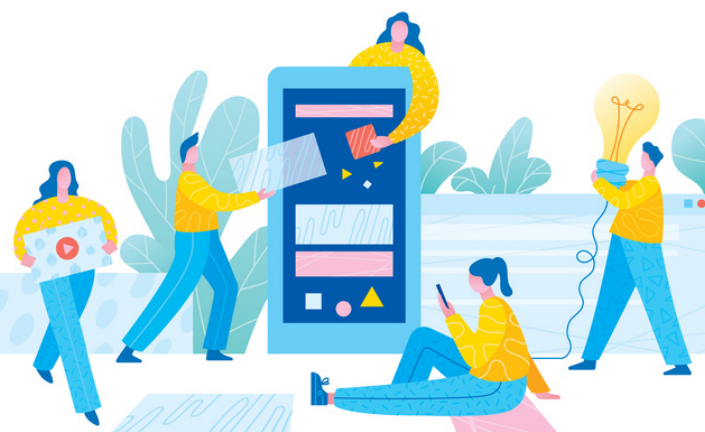

Importance of Consolidated Health Economic Evaluation Reporting Standards-Value of Information (CHEERS-VOI) Checklist

Health economic evaluation, which involves the comparison of costs and outcomes among alternative options, is integral to healthcare decision-making and highly influential for policymakers and payers. These analyses involve uncertainty and Value of Information (VOI) analysis to assess the potential impact of collecting additional data before decision-making. Therefore, to enhance transparency and rigor in reporting VOI analysis performed alongside economic evaluations, the Consolidated Health Economic Evaluation Reporting Standard-value of Information (CHEERS-VOI) checklist has been developed by adopting the existing CHEERS statements to specify essential information for reporting.

The development of the CHEERS-VOI checklist adhered to the recommendations from the Enhancing the Quality and Transparency of Health Research (EQUATOR) network and was led by a steering committee of experts in VOI analysis, economic evaluation, and guideline development, in alignment with the methods used for similar guidelines. This involved a Delphi study with 30, 25, and 24 participants in rounds 1st, 2nd and 3rd, including experts, and provided comments on 26 candidate reporting items. Items with mean scores greater than 7 or less than 4 were discussed in the meeting, where the steering committee determined the final checklist items. The CHEERS-VOI checklist consists of 33 items, including all 28 from the CHEERS statement, 7 of which were modified and 6 were new reporting items. This checklist development responds to the increasing need for standardized reporting of VOI and economic evaluations, enhancing the transparency and comparability of research in this area. It is intended to be used in future research submitting economic evaluation with VOI analyses for publication, facilitating consistent, comprehensive, and quality reporting of these analyses.

GLOBAL HEALTH THREAT FROM CLIMATE CHANGE

The drastic change of climatic condition poses a multifaceted impact on human health and well-being, with direct and indirect physical and systematic challenges. Rising global temperatures lead to increased intensity of extreme weather events including heatwaves, heavy rainfall and floods, draughts, melting of ice caps and rising the sea levels which can result in injury, displacement and even death. Further, frequent changes in climate patterns can alter distributions of disease vectors and spread infectious diseases into new regions. Likewise, it also has negative impacts on air and water quality, disturbance in food productions, prevalence of more chronic diseases, birth defects and disabilities, which have substantial impact on human well-being. Beyond these immediate health issues, climate change will result in substantial economic burden through direct and indirect costs associated with changes, high demand on healthcare resources and productivity losses. The dramatic shifts in global climate patterns emphasize the urgent need for increased awareness and proactive measures to reduce the health and economic consequences of climate change. Ultimately, it is crucial to engage in multidisciplinary research to assess the health and economic impact of climate change on healthcare systems and productivity.

This will enable the decision maker to allocate adequate resources and develop targeted interventions. Also, collaborative efforts are essential to reduce carbon emission for both environmental preservation and health benefits. These efforts include policy advocacy to promote renewable energy sources and sustainable uses of resources. Finally, public health interventions focusing on health action plans, improved screening and surveillance of climate-related diseases and development of climate-resilient healthcare infrastructure are recommended to enhance our capacity to respond to climate-related health issues effectively.

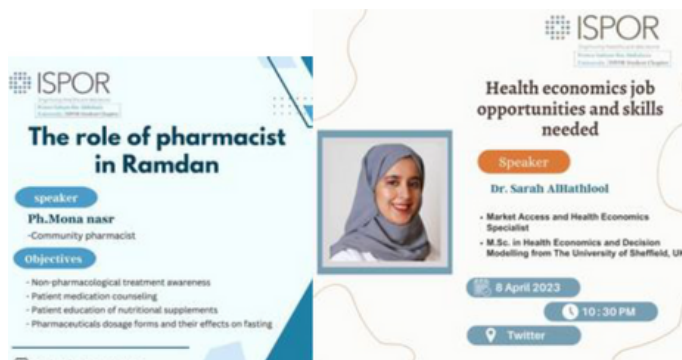
