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
## **Special Interest Group - Format**

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## **Task Forces**

**Mission:** To develop expert consensus guidance reports on international good practice standards for health economics and outcomes research and on the use of this research in healthcare decision making.

**Objective:** To publish Good Practices for Outcomes Research Reports

#### Composition:

Leadership Members are global experts and leaders in the selected topic who develop the manuscript.

Review Group consists of any ISPOR member who is knowledgeable and interested in the selected topic. The review group provides comments and feedback on drafts of the manuscript necessary to achieve a thorough, high quality, consensus task force report.

Task forces are disbanded after its Good Practices for Outcomes Research Report is published



## **Task Force Reports**

ISPOR has published 56 Good Practices for Outcomes Research Reports in *Value in Health* since 2003

- 25 of these reports are in the Top 50 Most Cited Articles in Value in Health
- Several are translated into multiple languages

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




## Health Technology Assessment (HTA) Council

 To support ISPOR student members' professional development by providing learning experiences, networking opportunities, and continuity to the student chapters




 As an advisory council to the ISPOR Board of Directors, council members facilitate the educational and professional development of students worldwide in HEOR


### Patient Council


### **Objectives:**
